FinnFest USA 2017

FinnFest USA is planning to hold its annual festival in the greater Detroit region in 2017. While the actual date and specific location is still under discussion, FinnFest USA is asking Detroit-area people to join together to bring FinnFest USA back to the Detroit region for the first time since 1987. With the second-largest Finnish population among metro regions in the U.S., Detroit creates an excellent site for the U.S.A.'s national celebration of Finland's 100th anniversary. What better way for Americans to commemorate a Finnish anniversary than to come to Detroit, home of the American automobile industry, where so many Finnish people came to work after their grandparents or parents migrated from Finland. Think Henry Ford Museum and the General Motors campus. Add Cranbrook, the institute through which the Saarinens and their colleagues introduced America to Finland's artistic gifts. Add sites like Finn Camp, one of the few remaining active camps founded by Finns in America. Yes, Detroit provides a wonderful place to celebrate the past, the present and the future of Finland and Finnish America.

FinnFest USA, the nonprofit corporation that creates the annual national festival, invites you to help create the 2017 festival. We want this festival to be about what Americans might enjoy experiencing about Finland and Finnish America today. We need to learn about your knowledge and interests. Help us define local resources. Hockey players, yes, but what else puts Finland and Finnish Americans on the map? We welcome volunteers to work on the different committees forming to create the festival. Join people from across the country to plan a festival that will be both fun and educational, a festival that will make Finland and Finnish America visible and tangible. Help us find the Detroit-area resources that only you know and can help make happen.

If you can't commit to volunteering now, think about volunteering just before the festival, during the festival or just after it. You could volunteer time and reduce your costs to attend the festival. In 2017, FinnFest USA will create in Detroit a Finnish American pop-up town, not just an ethnic festival, and you can be a part of making it happen.

our Cultural Committee, Carol Melancon. (She was erroneously identified in the *FAR* piece as chairperson of the full D.F.C.S.C.A.) The article was heavily researched and written by Carol, then edited by this newsletter's chairperson, David Hall, and illustrated and contributed to by the Newsletter Committee's graphics expert and web master Erick Leskinen.

In June 1925 the precursor organization of the D.F.C.S.C.A. bought a 100-acre farm on Loon Lake under a land contract for \$32,000 and established what we now know of as Finn Camp. Soon scrub was removed around Sun Lake and truckloads of sand dumped for a beach. Then the athletic field was created, on a base of old cars and such junk to stabilize the swampy land. Finn Camp survived the Depression, a calamitous rain in 1934, a collapse of the original four-story Sun Lake diving tower, and many another crises. Today, at the age of 90, it has a fifthgeneration membership and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. 

Member Spotlight: Reino and Shirley Jokinen



Reino and Shirley Jokinen both graduated from Rock High School in the Upper Peninsula. They were married in 1952, then moved to Detroit. Reino served in the U.S. Army. The flags at Loon Lake are in his honor. (Reino passed away in 1991.) Shirley and her mother, Katherine Larson, funded and arranged to have flag poles installed and furnished with the Finnish and American flags that had been presented to her from the VFW in Frazier, where Reino was a member. A plaque is installed at the flag pole base. Reino was with General Motors, retiring after twenty-five years. Shirley worked for the Frazier school district and retired after thirty years. Shirley says, "The first time I was at the Finn Camp was attending the Viola Turpeinen dance in 1949, and she was great!" Reino and Shirley became members in 1983 and bought camp 94. She still owns it. They have four sons: Gary, Dennis, Michael and Wayne are all members and three have camps. Shirley has nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Two of her grandchildren have camps also. The family's custom is that after the raising of the flag on Memorial Day each year, the Jokinens have a family photo taken and then have a party at camp 94. Shirley recollects that "we have all enjoyed all the activities over the years. Now our children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren can also enjoy the camp. I am very proud to be a member at the Finn Camp. And I look forward to any time I get to spend time there. I now have been living at Pine Ridge, a senior home, for the past year and a half."

Planning Ahead Paid Off

A big wind storm on Friday, February 19, knocked out power to the subdivision near Finn Camp and felled trees along Loon Lake Road. But we had no fallen trees in camp country, because we had been proactive with tree cutting and trimming over the past year. Many camps could have been seriously damaged had we not taken this action. Works Administrator Chris Eilola reports that "we have completed 80 to 85 percent of the tree and limb removal and expect to be completed by March 31."
