Annual Membership Meeting

St. Urho's Party

Due to state restrictions, we are not able to have the St Urho's party in March

— THE SAUNA IS OPEN BY APPOINTMENT ONLY! —

The sauna will be open 12:00 noon to 9:00 p.m. Saturdays & Sundays by appointment only using Signup Genius. A new signup link will be emailed and put on the Members Only Facebook Page at the beginning of each week. Sunday sauna will only be available if we have a volunteer to run it for work hours.

Sauna is limited to one 2-hour slot per person per day for members only - no guests permitted at this time. Sauna is by appointment only (no walk-ins) on a first-come first serve basis with 6 people allowed per 2-hour period per side. If you are not signed up via the Sign-up Genius link you will not be permitted to use the sauna. If you are on the delinquent list you will not be permitted to sign-up for sauna until your delinquency status has been lifted.

Only 6 people are permitted in each dressing room and 5 permitted inside the sauna at any one time. Do not attend sauna if you are ill. Each person will be asked COVID-19 screening questions upon entry. Please check in with the sauna manager before entering the building. A 24-hour notice to cancel your sauna appointment is required; otherwise you will be billed for the sauna fee of \$3.00 Please arrive promptly at your scheduled time, not earlier (please wait in your car if you are early). You must be out of the dressing room by the end of your scheduled time. Please be courteous to your fellow members. The sauna will be closed 4:00 to 5:00 p.m. for sanitation.

If the sauna must be closed or cancelled due to State Health Orders, a member of the Board of Directors will contact everyone who signed up that day. 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m. is reserved for those 65 years of age and older and those individuals with health risks.

Children of all ages count as 1 person so please include them on the signup if they are attending sauna. The lounge area remains closed. You may walk through to the dressing rooms but do not congregate in the lounge. You are required to wear a mask upon entry / exit and inside the dressing rooms and in the bathrooms. It is recommended that masks be worn inside the sauna but is not required. PRIVATE SAUNA RENTALS -

If you are interested in renting the sauna for private use outside normal operating hours, you can make arrangements through the social director, Joni Sennhenn, at 248-882-4626. The number of occupants for private rentals is limited until further notice to 6 people per side. It is \$25 per hour per side to rent (minimum of 2 hours) with a refundable \$50 cleaning deposit. You can rent one or both sides. The renter is responsible for cleaning the sauna, dressing room, bathroom and shower area after use in order for the cleaning deposit to be refunded. The member must be in good standing (zero balance on Finn Camp account) to rent the sauna. The contract and payment must be submitted to the social director prior to the date of rental.




WORK HOURS OPPORTUNITY -

HISTORY OF THE POWER HOUSE



If you're like me, it's easy to walk past the original structures on the Finn Camp grounds and take them for granted. But each one--built in the last century--has played an important role in the history of this heritage site, and we owe much to them for the comforts we enjoy today.

My husband Eero and I own one of the camps opposite the tan-colored power house. It's an old utilitarian clapboard building, the cracked window filled with discarded boxes, the white tip of the structure still not painted to match the tan paint of the upper section. And, yet, over the years I've come to appreciate and love this old landmark. When Eero was asked to fortify the supporting posts and paint the screening a few years ago, I became interested in the age and history of this historic building, but it wasn't until I started digging for information for this article, that I got some answers. I was pointed in the direction of several helpful camp members: Harry Kansman, Russ Matero and Carol Melancon, who provided the information below.


The power house was probably built in 1946-just after WWII came to an end and 20 years after the first camp had been built--in a style all its own. Russ Matero suspects that much of the installation of the electric poles and wires, as well as the wiring, were done by Camp members. According to Russ, "in the 1970's

Camp members. According to Russ, "in the 1970's the main circuit breakers and wiring inside of the power house had a major upgrade by former member and electrician Corky Koronan. During the 1960's and 1970's, member Jack Karell and his son Mark replaced

old poles and broken wires, but most electric poles were getting so bad that the Camp Country electrical needed a major upgrade." This upgrade-a replacement of all electric poles, wires and Camp meters--was completed around 1982 by an outside contractor for \$40,000 which would be approximately \$110,000 today.

Russ speculates that the power house was "probably [...] designed with an elevated floor so that all the main circuit breakers and main meter were at the same level as the incoming and outgoing wires to keep the [electrical] design simple." He also suggests that the lower half was probably left open since it had no specific function other than to support the top level. He adds that the central location for the power house was close to the nearby DTE [formerly Detroit Edison] electric lines which then allowed electricity to be supplied to both the west- and east-side camps. It's impressive to think about all the construction that was done before the power house was built. Consider the existing ravintola and the tanssi saali [dance hall]. How much man power was needed to complete such large projects? Or to dig the canal from Sun Lake to Loon Lake? How were trees trimmed or cut down? And think of the work to haul the water to make food and then wash the dishes! How much leisure time was left for the adults?!

LIFE AT THE FINN CAMP BEFORE ELECTRICITY





For these answers, I turned to one of our most senior members, Harry Kansman, as well as to Carol Melancon, who wrote an article about the Finn Camp's 90th Anniversary for the Finnish American Reporter. Harry's family had an eastside camp, which was lit with kerosene lanterns, as were most camps. Cooking was done on a kerosene stove [see photo above]. Keeping dairy cold was clearly a bigger challenge without refrigerators, but there were two solutions: an icebox, into which an ice block was placed, as the Kansmans did; or, a cold storage box dug into the earth beneath the camp. Ice blocks were available at the Camp Store located beneath the Dance Hall. As to bathroom facilities? Harry tells us that there were several outhouses on the property and water was pumped from a few wells. One of those wells is still in use in the "inner circle" on the east side.



The power house changed how Finn campers lived after 1946 and how we live now... fans help to cool our camps, kerosene stoves have given way to cooktops and microwaves, electric lights brighten our camps, and refrigerators keep perishables safe and cold. Outhouses have been replaced by bathrooms and showers—even if they're some steps away. By some folks' standards, it's pretty rustic living. But for those of us who are fortunate enough to own a camp, we understand that it's all part of the twentieth—century Finn Camp experience. And we cherish our rustic life—if only for a day or two at a time.

SISU Sisters Corner

The lovely Finn Camp Butterfly Garden--home to indigenous plants that attract and support butterflies--was established in 2014. The humble milkweed plays an important role in the garden: caterpillars that munch on milkweed safely ingest a toxin that is poisonous to many other species; this toxin affords caterpillars protection from predators.



Last summer we had a surprise "guest" at the Butterfly Garden--a praying mantis--which many of us thought was a welcome member to the --

family of creatures. That is, until Tracey Calnen brought to my attention that the mantis kills butterflies! Needless to say, it was a bit of a shock. I have read many articles, watched numerous videos, etc, and have never seen this nugget of important information. Please be on the lookout for this unwanted visitor in your butterfly garden, too.



An especially nice addition—for both the butterflies and members—has been the Giving Herb Garden, where butterflies can feast to hearts' content and members can help themselves to wonderful, fresh thyme, oregano, cilantro, parsley, basil and tomatœs. Did you try a "black tomato" or kumato last summer—a nice firm tomato with great flavor!

A nearby hose has been hung on the ravintola wall--it's in easy reach to water the thirsty garden in hot summer months. We appreciate members' help in giving our plants a little drink!
